MR. LEMAY: Okay. Opening remarks. I have none. We've got one new agenda item, that is labeled "Internal Controls," we'll discuss that last under New Business. Approval of minutes, first, the Town Council meeting of May the 8th, 2023. Usually I just skim these, but this one I read carefully. I'm concerned about these minutes. There's a paragraph in them that discusses that month's -- the -- I guess -- what's the word -- agenda item to remove Tim Perry from office. I've read this carefully; it seems quite bias; I know --

(Zoom recording stopped.)

MS. McFADDEN: Did I do that? Okay. I need help.

(Zoom recording in progress.)

MR. LEMAY: All right. I'll start over.

I have concerns about these minutes of May the 8th of 2023; particularly, the part that discusses the removal of Tim Perry from office, that motion was not approved. However, the

minutes are, I think, quite bias. They tend to trivialize Mr. Perry's misconduct. I would suggest that what we should do in place of what is in that paragraph in the minutes is to actually just put a transcription of what exactly was said. It won't be a whole lot of work, but I think it will be a much more accurate representation of what happened at that meeting.

I'd like to note that those problems have continued with the clerk/treasurer's office, largely due to this council's inaction. Number one, over \$60 in interest and late fees have been charged to the town this month alone. We've had three post-due (sic) notices from our vendors, and we've had three checks that came back to the town that said -- did not clear from the bank. So, I think these minutes need to reflect what really happened --

MR. PERRY: Well, what really happened is quite trivial, and if you would stop trying to vilify me at every opportunity, maybe you could do a better job of running the Town Council, sir.

MR. LEMAY: Thank you, Mr. Perry. I would like to not approve those minutes and have them resubmitted. I'll make that motion.

THE VIDEOGRAPHER: Nolah Gertner needs to mute her microphone.

MR. LEMAY: That is during public comments, a Vicki Znavor of 2305 Lakeshore Drive commented about Council members bragging to the public of putting a "caboose" on the public safety building. I believe that was supposed to be "kibosh." So, if we could get that fixed, and with that amendment, I'd make a motion to approve those minutes.

MR. JOHNSTONE: Second.

MR. LEMAY: All in favor, say aye.

(Ayes in unison.)

MR. LEMAY: Next is the minutes of the special Town Council meeting of June 23rd. There, again, I have one concern. Where in one of the paragraphs on the last page, it talked about how John Wall gave a — gave lengthy stories of 45 years on the fire department. I don't think we need adjectives like "lengthy." I would like to make a motion strike that, and with that amendment, I'll go ahead and make a motion to approve those minutes; is there a second?

MR. WALL: I'll second.

MR. LEMAY: All in favor, say aye. Aye.

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1 MR. WALL: Aye. 2 MR. LEMAY: Really. Wow. All opposed? 3 MS. McFADDEN: Aye. 4 MR. JOHNSTONE: Opposed. 5 MR. LEMAY: Okay. Then I want that also in 6 the minutes, that we asked --7 MR. KOCHER: Are we objecting to the word 8 "lengthy"? 9 MR. LEMAY: Yeah, that seems a bit 10 pejorative, don't you think? 11 MR. KOCHER: He has been on there 35 years; 12 right? 13 MR. LEMAY: No, no, "lengthy stories," John. 14 MR. KOCHER: Lengthy stories? 15 MR. WALL: Look, John. Here's the point of 16 view of myself and Bob: These minutes are being 17 politicized by the people that are putting them 18 down in the minutes. So, it's a little 19 objectionable to me the way it's politicized. 20 you're gonna take minutes from a meeting, you 21 ought to have an objective look at the meeting 22 minutes and summarize them with some kind of 23 consistency. It's very obvious, if you read the 24 minutes, what's going on. They're subjectively

LEMAY: With that explanation, John, do MR. KOCHER: Where -- Where's the MR. WALL: Well, if you wanna pound through MR. KOCHER: No, I just wanna know where is it he wants to amend? I'm not reading it. MR. LEMAY: It's the second page, about halfway down. Actually, it's the third paragraph from the end. Starts off with, "Wall then gives a -- his lengthy stories of his 45 years in the fire department." So, "lengthy" is describing the stories, not how long he served on the fire MR. WALL: Not only that, the comments that were -- making, when she talks about -- one of my comments, she puts one specific line comment in there without referring at all to the gist of the

conversation, which was that the septic permit was

1	politicized, people on the Council, as well as
2	other individuals in the town politicized that by
3	getting ahold of people at the health departments,
4	that is the gist of the conversation. Instead, we
5	get a one-liner. One-liner about, you know, my

8	MS. McFADDEN: Did you do the Town Council
9	one July 10th?
10	MR. LEMAY: That's pending. That's not out
11	there yet.
12	MS. McFADDEN: Okay.
13	MR. LEMAY: Chief?
14	CHIEF SWISTEK: Good evening, everyone. For
15	the month of July, the Long Beach Police
16	Department responded to 328 calls for service when
17	compared to 245 calls for service in the previous
18	year for an increase of 83 calls for service.
19	During the month of July, 22 incident reports were
20	documented, a total of 13 individuals were
21	arrested, one felony arrest for operating a motor
22	vehicle while intoxicated with a previous
23	conviction, a felony arrest for a vehicle pursuit
24	with multiple drug charges. That pursuit actually
25	ended just over the Indiana/Michigan line.

And we had 11 misdemeanor arrests; one was for resisting law enforcement and disorderly conduct, a warrant arrest out of St. Joe County, five individuals were arrested for traffic-related offenses, and five arrests for operating a motor vehicle while intoxicated.

We still continue -- In the month of July, we had at least one individual that was arrested on a golf cart while intoxicated with children present on the golf cart. I cannot emphasize enough the importance of not operating a golf cart while intoxicated; it's no different than a motor vehicle, and especially when you have children present, it actually elevates the charge to a felony charge.

I'd like to talk about a couple incidents for the month of July. Back on July 5th,

Deputy Matthew Farthing assisted the Michigan City

Fire Department in the 600 Block of Nahas, just off of U.S. 12. During the response of this call, he was first on scene. A male was observed walking back to the actual scene of a fully engulfed house that was on fire. While speaking to the individual, he made statements about the particular fire while reaching for a handgun in

his waistband. Deputy Farthing acted very quickly, was able to take the individual into custody and recover the firearm without being injured. I would like to commend him for his actions on that day.

Then on July 13th, we had a personal injury accident in front of Hacienda. On that particular morning, an elderly Long Beach resident was observed traveling southbound on Karwick Road, also known as Chastleton Drive, appeared to have lost consciousness, struck a tree, broke her arm during the actual accident, and Deputy Yagelski was able to apply a tourniquet to the injured arm to stop some of the bleeding until the paramedics had arrived. So, excellent job by Deputy Yagelski, and also the response that we received from the Long Beach Fire Department. Their response also aided in this injury.

And then, lastly, I'd like to talk about a gun recovery at Stop 24. Back on July 27th,

Deputy Matthew Farthing, while on routine patrol,

observed a suspicious vehicle parked in the

ten-minute loading zone at Stop 24. Upon

confronting the vehicle, he observed a Glock

handgun inside the vehicle; he eventually

confronted five individuals that were associated 1 2 to the vehicle. None of them were residents of 3 the town, and he is currently seeking search warrants for DNA samples to figure out who was the actual owner of the gun. And, again, he did an excellent job heads-up patrolling by Deputy Farthing. And then, lastly, we -- I talked about this Indiana Criminal Justice Institute; I was just

last month, the grant that we applied through the contacted this morning that we are receiving three new laptop computers for patrol cars to include printers and handheld scanners all at no cost to the town. And this was through a state-funded grant through the Indiana Criminal Justice Institute that we will be picking up in the next couple of weeks. And that's all I have for now.

MR. LEMAY: And the town administrator report, Chief?

CHIEF SWISTEK: I can cover those on the agenda as --

MR. LEMAY: Okay.

CHIEF SWISTEK: -- we come across those.

MR. LEMAY: Great. Volunteer fire department. Tom Yemc? Oh, Kurt?

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MR. EARNST: Nice that I blend in.

MR. KOCHER: Turn on your mic.

MR. WALL: You gotta hold that down for a second. It's on.

There you go. My voice usually MR. EARNST: carries, so I usually don't need it, but good evening to the town. Mr. Yemc is out of town, so he asked me to sub in today, which I was happy to do. Presently, for the month of July, we had ten calls of a fire-related nature. Year-to-date, 42 calls as opposed to this time last year 34 calls. On the medical side, we had ten calls for the month of July. Total medical calls for the year, 58 as opposed to 45 this time last year. Year-to-date average response for a fire call, 4.53 minutes. Year-to-date overall average response for medical calls is 4.29 minutes. And. to date, members have donated at least 1,609 volunteer hours to the service of the Town of Long Beach.

A few other points that I would like to bring to the court's -- or to the -- "courts" -- put on my other hat -- the town's attention. One is that, obviously, the numbers are higher, and we anticipate those numbers to be higher, I think

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both on the police side and the fire side;

perhaps -- going down once the summer ends, but

we've had a lot of permanent residents, so,

obviously, we think that's going to continue.

Reminder, also, about the issue of power lines. We've had a lot of power lines down the last month or two. Urging everyone to be very cautious. If you see that, report it, keep your distance. Just because you're at a distance does not mean you're out of danger, especially at times of storms, water can transmit electricity, those power lines are down, they're a danger. Last couple of calls we've had, they've actually melted the blacktop. This is very serious, and, again, if you see it, call it in from a distance, whether it's sparking or not, and then we'll take care of it and turn it over to NIPSCO or the appropriate agency.

I also want to highlight that, once again, tonight, the members of the fire department are at the training facility on Hitchcock Road in Michigan City braving the high rain, training on hose. This is the third time they've been out there this year and anticipate maybe one more time before the year is out. So, obviously, we're

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taking as much time, even though we're in the transition period with the public safety building to continue to make sure that our training is sharp in case we are needed.

Along the lines of training, I want to thank Chief Swistek and his staff; recently, they put on a demonstration of the drone so we can hopefully work with that and understand a little bit better. The last structure fire that we had, that I obviously had an injury at, that was very helpful in finding hotspots which was very helpful in mitigating the amount of times we had to come out. They've made that available whenever we need it. Also, the ATV that they have, they also let us use that, as well, so we can use that if we need to for beach emergencies or other matters, so wanna thank Chief Swistek for the incredible cooperation we've had for the service of the town. Also him providing some much-needed office space for us during our transition so our people can do our computer reporting and things of that nature, so we thank you for that accommodation, as well.

We are almost out of the old station; I believe the demolition is scheduled for at or about -- or after September 1st of this year,

we'll be out on or before that time. Right now, it's kind of a skeleton over there. We've got a lot of it in a semi trailer. And then, of course, we're in the process of transitioning to the town garage. We thank the town for allowing us to use that for this time frame. So, that's the process of happening.

And we also want to highlight the fact that we're gonna have a groundbreaking ceremony a week from Friday, I believe it's the 25th, at 10:00. We certainly invite and urge the town board members who have been so supportive to be there for that momentous occasion so we can enjoy that official groundbreaking. The ground obviously's broken, this would be an official thing with shovels and things of that nature. So, we urge all to attend that momentous occasion. Is there any questions for the town?

MS. McFADDEN: So, they moved to Karwick, the truck and everything?

MR. EARNST: We will be -- The engines will be moving once -- About a week or so before the building's being demolished, we're gonna move the engines out to the town garage.

MS. McFADDEN: Okay.

MR. EARNST: And they'll be housed there for safekeeping, being out of the elements, until we can move back in at a later date, which might be just a few months from now, but I'll leave that to John to give you an update on that if need be.

But that way we make sure they're not out in the elements because you just never know what could happen. We don't want them sitting out in the open.

MS. McFADDEN: Right.

MR. EARNST: Too much for damage and also people tend to take things because things can be taken off those trucks and even though the police do a very good job of monitoring, they can't watch everything. Again, it's gonna get cold here relatively quickly, and the last thing we want is to have a bunch of snow on them. So, they'll be out there and we'll be out there on a temporary basis ready to preserve and protect the Town of Long Beach. Questions?

MR. LEMAY: Thanks, Kurt.

MR. EARNST: Thank you.

MS. McFADDEN: Thank you.

MR. LEMAY: Fire commission, John?

MR. WALL: Fire commission met. There were

just a couple of us there. Probably ought to look at summer meeting schedules. But, at any rate, we discussed the public safety building a little bit, and we also talked about fire truck financing. I do have a little bit of news on that. I spoke to Karl Cender earlier today. He intends to go out and try to get some bank quotes for the fire truck financing so that we can put that together before the end of the year. He'll probably coordinate with Clerk Perry. I think Tim had maybe started some of that. But, at any rate, we'll try to get some local banks involved as well in that effort. That's all I've got for the fire commission.

MR. LEMAY: Okay. Public works, Mary Lou?

MS. McFADDEN: We did not meet in the month

of July, so we will be meeting in the month of

August. Fourth Monday of the month.

MR. LEMAY: Park Board. Joy?

MS. SCHMITT: Good evening, everyone. Park
Board met on July 25th. We'd like to give a huge
thank you to the Long Beach Police Department, the
Beach Garden Club, Sarah and the summer camp
counselors, and the participating artists for
another successful Art In The Park. Also, for the
first time ever, I think summer camp this year has

1 paid for itself plus some change, so kudos to 2 Sarah for making that happen. The railings at 3 Stop 21 and Stop 23 have been completed. We have 4 a \$500 bid from Arndt to cover up the pickleball 5 stripes on the basketball court over by the 6 community center. The Long Beach Country Club 7 Board of Directors has no objection, so Parks is 8 seeking approval of Council to proceed with that 9 project. 10 MS. McFADDEN: Why do we want to cover it up? 11 MS. SCHMITT: We didn't -- We never wanted 12 pickleball --13 MS. McFADDEN: I -- I know that, but if we're 14 not using it, --15 MS. SCHMITT: People are using it. They're 16 dragging the nets over there, they're ruining the 17 nets and playing over there. 18 MS. McFADDEN: Oh, okay. I do walk, but I 19 haven't seen them over there. 20 MS. SCHMITT: Yeah, they have been. So, for \$500, that would be our proposal to paint over 21 22 them. 23 MS. McFADDEN: Okay. 24 MR. LEMAY: You need a vote from us on that? 25 MS. SCHMITT: Yes.

MR. LEMAY: I'll make a motion to approve the \$500.

MR. WALL: I'll second it.

MR. LEMAY: Discussion? All in favor, say aye.

(Ayes in unison.)

MS. SCHMITT: Thank you. A meeting was held at Stop 15 with neighboring residents and Global Engineering to discuss the preliminary design of the ADA stop, you know, the emergency beach access location. Global will be submitting the pre-grant application this month, and the hope for all of us, including the residents, is to make the least amount of impact on the landscape as possible. So, we want to be clear that we will be going over the foredune, not bulldozing it. A lot of people were worried that they were going to bulldoze the dune.

So, as soon and we hear back from them, that project will be progressing. Hopefully, the coastal grant we'll know maybe by December or January whether or not we got it. Park Board is handling all the funding and getting the grant going, which is about \$40,000.

MS. McFADDEN: Is Stop 15 Blanchard Court?

MS. SCHMITT: No. That's Stop 14.

MS. McFADDEN: Okay.

MS. SCHMITT: And, lastly, the Park Board was tasked by the Council to identify and propose a plan for encroachment at the stops. So, we're currently looking at Stop 29, so I provided a survey for everyone there.

And our original issue was you'll see -- it's kind of small -- but you'll see some green trees, which are evergreens down there, that were planted last year by the homeowner to the west. And so, we asked that those be removed because we thought they were on town property but we weren't sure, so we had this survey done. And, clearly, they're on town property.

The problem is the homeowner put them in because they wanted to block their view of people coming down to the beach, but now the people coming down on the beach have their view blocked of the lake. So, the Park Board, after getting the survey done, you can see that their driveway at the top is, like, six feet onto town property.

Now, they received a access and maintenance easement from the town, so they are allowed to use that. We would ask -- The Park Board would ask

1 that the trees be removed, and I think 2 Mr. Voortman said that would be no problem. 3 And --4 MS. McFADDEN: Can we save them for 5 something? 6 They're his trees, so I think MS. SCHMITT: 7 he'll plant them somewhere else. 8 MR. LEMAY: They're little? 9 MS. SCHMITT: Pardon me? 10 MR. LEMAY: They're little? 11 MS. SCHMITT: They're fairly small now. 12 little, but they're gonna be really big. The only 13 question we have, and so we were going to ask that 14 those trees be removed. We would like to put a 15 split-rail fence along the area that shows the 16 town property, like we've done at other stops, and 17 the question we have -- you can see there's a 18 gravel road coming down -- or gravel something 19 coming down from the back of that residence. 20 MS. McFADDEN: Like that? That part? Okay. 21 MS. SCHMITT: And so, we're not sure what 22 happens on that little gravel road, but it is on 23 town property so our question is liability. 24 think that's a question for Chris. Is the town

liable for anything that happens on that --

1	MS. McFADDEN: What do they use this for?
2	MS. SCHMITT: I have no idea what they use it
3	for.
4	MS. McFADDEN: Okay. I mean, it's
5	MS. SCHMITT: My guess, it's there to get
6	their toys and stuff to the beach.
7	MS. McFADDEN: Okay.
8	MS. SCHMITT: But I don't know if that's a
9	liability issue or if the town wants to do
10	something about that or not. It really does not
11	affect people going down to the beach, but we were
12	concerned about liability.
13	MR. LEMAY: We don't know who put it in?
14	MS. SCHMITT: I don't know.
15	MR. LEMAY: And so the thought is that the
16	homeowner to the west is using that to bring toys
17	down or people up other people
18	MS. SCHMITT: Yes, that would be my guess.
19	MR. LEMAY: Other people?
20	MS. SCHMITT: Yes.
21	MR. WALL: No, you can't get to it. So, this
22	brown thing, this is actual drive over here, so
23	he's going down there on his own property. Well,
24	partly our property easement and his property.
25	And when you get down here, then he's got this

1 little stub down here. It doesn't really access 2 the beach per se, it accesses the front of his 3 house, is essentially what it does. 4 MR. LEMAY: Is that gravel part on his 5 property or on town property? 6 MS. SCHMITT: No, the town's. 7 MR. LEMAY: This is a weird lot. We traded 8 something --9 MR. WALL: Jacobson's, years ago, when the 10 garage was in the wrong spot and then they traded 11 Jacobson's property. 12 MR. WILLOUGHBY: Is there any usage of it 13 that you perceive for the town? 14 MS. SCHMITT: No. 15 MR. WILLOUGHBY: Based on what you're doing? 16 You know, might I suggest -- and liability is a 17 funny thing, and I hate to say you're not liable 18 or you are because if someone makes a plan and 19 something happens there, someone other than us is 20 going to decide that. 21 But might I suggest that, if you're inclined, 22 to look at it, and if it is being used, that 23 somehow we wrap it into a maintenance similar-type 24 easement where they're responsible and then they 25 indemnify the town so that you're not disrupting

1	what might have been there for a long time. So,
2	just a thought. Especially if you don't have
3	plans for that area; if there are plans, then
4	that's a different conversation.
5	MS. SCHMITT: That may be something you guys
6	want to think about, what happens to that gravel
7	road. Right now, we would just ask if it's
8	okay that we ask the homeowner to remove the trees
9	and let them know that we're gonna put split-rail
10	fencing in to denote town property.
11	MR. LEMAY: And if we were to try and remedy
12	the situation of that gravel road, what would we
13	do?
14	MS. SCHMITT: Well, the Park Board would like
15	to turn it all into dune grass, but that would be
16	an expensive project, as well.
17	MR. LEMAY: Not something you guys are
18	prepared to do now?
19	MS. SCHMITT: Not this year, no. Probably
20	not next year.
21	MR. LEMAY: Okay.
22	MS. SCHMITT: And that's it. Any questions
23	about Park Board?
24	MS. McFADDEN: Thank you, Joy.
25	MR. LEMAY: Community Center, Joy?

1	MS. McFADDEN: Do we need to vote on the
2	trees?
3	MR. KOCHER: I don't know why. They're on
4	town property.
5	MR. LEMAY: Yeah, we can always remove trees
6	on town property.
7	MS. McFADDEN: But you'll let them know?
8	MS. SCHMITT: Zach already talked to him
9	about it, and I think they're very willing to move
10	the trees.
11	MR. LEMAY: Any other questions about Park
12	Board? Community Center, Joy?
13	MS. SCHMITT: Community Center met earlier
14	today; we had lengthy discussions regarding
15	maintenance issues and the Community Center
16	capital and operating budgets. And they asked me
17	to ask the Council for some help getting copies of
18	the NIPSCO bills. We haven't been able to get
19	those from the clerk's office. We always used to
20	get them.
21	(Overlapping speech.)
22	MS. McFADDEN: I'll get those.
23	MS. SCHMITT: Thank you.
24	MS. McFADDEN: I'm sure I can get 'em. I
25	know somebody there.

1 MS. SCHMITT: We could use them all for this 2 year. 3 MS. McFADDEN: Just so you keep a record --4 Is that Deanna? 5 MS. CARLSON: This is Deanna. I can get 6 those. It used to be a normal everyday thing that 7 I did but, you know, with so many people changing 8 hands in the office, it's not something I can't 9 get very quickly. So, I'll send those, Joy. 10 MS. SCHMITT: Thank you, Deanna. We could 11 use them for the whole year. 12 MS. McFADDEN: From January? 13 MS. SCHMITT: I think we had them from 14 February but if you can get them from January, 15 that would be great. Any questions on the 16 Community Center? That's it. Thank you very 17 much. 18 MR. LEMAY: Budget and finance. Who's gonna 19 do that one? 20 MR. WALL: I can take it. Budget and finance met on August the 9th. We had a fairly extensive 21 22 meeting; essentially, we started the meeting with 23 department heads presenting their capital needs 24 and their rough idea of what they wanted to do

with some of their budget items for the coming

year for the budget process, which we need to finalize a rough draft of by the end of August.

So, the budget working group tasked -- has tasked themselves with having to meet before the end of the month to try and pound that out along with Cender and the clerk's office.

And then after we did the department presentations on their budgets and capital requests, then we went into our standard budget and finance meeting. Trista Hudson from Cender was there, and she helped us with some new projections on 2022 closeouts. I think at that point, there was a little bit left to be done in terms of some housekeeping items, but, essentially, she's confident that we've got '22 numbers pretty well in hand.

She did send out to all of the Council members a revised set of financial statements for the year 2022; we talked about the quarterly and midyear financial statements. They're gonna continue to provide information to us and work with the clerk's office and the Council to keep that — those financial statements current.

Unfinished business: We talked about the cash management. We do have quite a bit of money

in CDs right now; I think they're going to adjust those positions to be a little more accurate in terms of where our cash needs are on a monthly basis. But, yeah, we are making some interest. Tim reported -- Clerk reported on that at a prior meeting, and that continues to happen. So, we're in a better position in terms of what cash is in CDs. Trista's making some recommendations; We've probably overcommitted on one that's going out, I think, so the working group will have a more succinct report for you guys at the next meeting after we kind of finalize where we're at with the budgets, where we're at with some of the account balances.

CCMG, we talked about the capital plan, we

CCMG, we talked about the capital plan, we already worked about. Public works, we have the bids this evening. In fact, I'd like to make -- recommend that we maybe we open those bids. Haas is -- Haas Engineering -- or Haas & Associates is here tonight. Maybe if we can move those forward, you know, right after this report rather than having him stay all night.

Fire truck financing, public safety building. We talked about the check verification system. I think we worked the bugs out of that, or will

shortly if we haven't already. And then the budget process was discussed. That was about all of it, unless you have any other comments, Mike, as far as -- I don't know if Clerk Perry has anything else on that, but, essentially, that's the extent of the budget and finance report.

MS. McFADDEN: Do you wanna -- Okay, which ones would I be -- because I've got Tom Carlson, I've got Grimmer Construction, and I've got Woodruff.

MR. WALL: What was the first one, Mary Lou?

MS. McFADDEN: H&G Underground.

MR. WALL: Okay. So, we have three bids, then. At this point, normally, what the procedure would be is we pop those open and read the lump sum base bid from each of the three contractors and then they'd be referred to the engineer and the attorney for further review. There won't be an award this evening, it would just be reading the bids --

MS. McFADDEN: So, it's all for the same project?

MR. WALL: Yes. This the water service project -- the Lakeshore Drive -- yeah, the Lakeshore Drive water service project.

1	MS. McFADDEN: So, this is for the public
2	this is for the public
3	MR. WALL: Here, if you wanna just pass it
4	down. You're just looking for the lump sum. Sam,
5	do you want to come up here and help us with the
6	lump sum paperwork. It should be one page with
7	the bid on it. There's all kinds of information
8	in there, but you only need really one number.
9	I'm sorry. Sam represents Haas & Associates. He
10	knows the paperwork well enough to find the base
11	bid number.
12	MS. McFADDEN: Good, Sam. Don't make me look
13	bad. Okay. So, this is from What was the name
14	of this one? This is from
15	H&G Underground Utilities. And it's that number?
16	1,774,121.50. Should I be writing that down?
17	MR. WALL: I am.
18	MS. McFADDEN: Sam, stay up here. Thank you.
19	Okay. And so, this is from Grimmer Construction
20	out of Highland, Indiana, and their total is
21	1,381,562.50.
22	MR. WALL: And we're reading the base bid
23	numbers; correct, Sam?
24	MR. OZEH: Yes.
25	(Overlapping speech.)

MS. McFADDEN: That would be -- Yes. And this is from Woodruff, 699,687.88.

MR. WALL: That's base bid?

MS. McFADDEN: Yes.

(Overlapping speech.)

MR. WALL: So, typically, what's done then -and, Chris, correct me if I'm wrong -- but Chris,
the town attorney, will review those for the
paperwork that's required -- the legal paperwork
that's required, and then Haas --

(Overlapping speech.)

MR. WALL: For those at home, what Sam just stated was, that he will take a copy of each bid to review and make a recommendation to the town. And then Chris will review the legal paperwork at the point where that recommendation -- We appreciate it, Sam, and you're certainly welcome to stay if you'd like, but --

MR. LEMAY: Sam, I appreciate what you just did for us. I'm gonna change the order of the agenda. I'm gonna put the private sewers next on the agenda because I think you wanted to discuss that, too; right? Okay. So, we're switching the agenda here to private sewers. That's, again, from Haas Engineering and -- Can we figure out

1	who's doing that?
2	MR. WALL: If you're not talking, shut your
3	microphone off.
4	MS. McFADDEN: What did you say?
5	MR. WALL: If you're not talking, shut your
6	microphone off.
7	MS. McFADDEN: Oh, me?
8	MR. LEMAY: I don't know; we'll see. And so,
9	this is regarding the private sewers from the
10	properties on Lakeshore Drive. And so, a couple
11	of concerns that I have Now, I know we saw
12	further plans from you guys
13	MS. McFADDEN: Was that old business?
14	MR. LEMAY: That is under unfinished
15	business, yeah. And your new plans now, you're
16	not gonna be digging on Lakeshore Drive or
17	Chastleton, I understand; is that correct?
18	MR. OZEH: I'm sure we are still going to
19	install it along Lakeshore Drive
20	MR. LEMAY: But not Chastleton?
21	MR. OZEH: at Chastleton. But we are not
22	gonna be doing any work within the pavement.
23	MR. LEMAY: Right, so no digging in the
24	pavement.
25	MR. OZEH: No. No digging in the pavement.

MR. LEMAY: So, it'll all be in the right-of-way but not in the pavement.

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MR. OZEH: Yes.

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MR. LEMAY: Okay. So, that's good. progress. Couple of concerns that I have, there are probably gonna be more. But I think we need -- we're gonna need to come up -- your attorneys and our attorneys need to come up with a maintenance agreement. Because if this thing malfunctions, particularly in the dead of winter and we've got poop bubbling up from the right-of-way, not the pavement, we still need to make sure somebody's gonna fix that, and that shouldn't really be the town's responsibility. need to come up with a lease agreement because you're on the right-of-way. We need to figure out what happens if your LLC goes belly up because the town doesn't want to be holding the bag. we're gonna need to see that LLC agreement. And then, of course, you guys are gonna have to be responsible for the attorney fees for all this negotiation because, again, it shouldn't be the town's deal. It's not gonna be really an asset the town's gonna benefit from, except for those property owners. And then, finally, we need to

1 see the agreement that we -- these are my 2 concerns. We need to see the agreement between 3 the LLC and Michigan City and Michigan City 4 Sanitary. Those are the concerns that I had. 5 Now, are there other concerns? Chris? 6 MR. WILLOUGHBY: No. At some point -- it's 7 been some time, but Attorney Wojcik and I have 8 been in communication long ago when it started 9 picking up some momentum. So, I'll anticipate 10 that he will propose the formal documents to get 11 it rolling, so I haven't seen those yet. 12 MR. LEMAY: Okay. So, I guess at this point, 13 we need to hear from your attorney about that and 14 make sure you guys are okay with the attorney fees 15 before our attorney continues talking with your 16 attorney. And then -- Anybody -- I don't know, if 17 we're -- I guess we need to see those agreements 18 before we --19 MR. WILLOUGHBY: I'll reach out to 20 Mr. Wojcik, too, just so we're all in the same 21 loop. 22 MR. LEMAY: Okay. 23 (Overlapping speech.) 24 MR. LEMAY: Super. Sam, I think we're -- if 25 everything's good, we don't have any more we need

to do with that. I think you can actually go home and see your family.

MR. OZEH: Thank you.

MR. LEMAY: Thank you. Next up, Human Resources. Mary Lou.

MS. McFADDEN: We did not meet in the month of August; we will be meeting in the month of September. We'll be working on salary surveys and on the new cost of the medical insurance and some other things.

MR. LEMAY: Next up, Tree Board. Ellen Lynch?

MS. LYNCH: Hi. I'm Ellen Lynch, Tree Board. We did not meet this month because the -- we did not meet this month because the chairman had COVID. So, I had COVID. My husband had COVID. It was crazy. Anyway, but I did -- we did finish the tree ordinance. And thank you very much, Mr. LeMay, for all the helping -- help with this and going through it and editing it and putting all the fine tuning on it. So, tree ordinance is completed. And hopefully you guys will be able to vote on it soon. Any questions? If any of you have read it, reach out to me or even ask questions now. I don't think this is the day to

do that, though.

MR. LEMAY: So, I think let's consider that tree ordinance. We'll, again, change the agenda order. I think everybody's had a chance to read it. Ellen and I got together and made some amendments.

MS. LYNCH: He caught all my mistakes, is what he did.

MR. LEMAY: Well, I don't know about that, but . . . One thing that I saw was Section 99.11, and that would basically just to say that the notification of the property owner when we're gonna be taking down trees adjacent to their property needs to apply to both sections 99.10 and 99.11.

MS. LYNCH: Okay.

MR. LEMAY: And, again, I penciled those in and we can maybe give them to Chris and you can maybe make those changes, Chris? I'll get together with you and we can do that.

MS. LYNCH: Okay.

MR. LEMAY: And one other place, Section 99.15, there's a sentence -- boy, my eyes are not working tonight. I can't do this; can you read that?

1	MR. WALL: Request for hearing within five
2	days for the property owner notification.
3	MR. LEMAY: Yeah, so we're not saying I
4	wanted to make sure
5	MR. WALL: This is for an appeal.
6	MR. LEMAY: Yeah, this is basically We
7	want to make it five days from when the
8	notification is received by the property owners
9	MS. LYNCH: So, you want me to clarify that?
10	Okay. Okay. So, 95 11.95, 15 and I'll do
11	that; all right? I can do that and then send it
12	to you?
13	MR. LEMAY: We can talk about it again.
14	MS. LYNCH: Okay. I'm only a block away.
15	MS. McFADDEN: So, postpone it? Because I
16	MR. LEMAY: I think If you guys are okay
17	with it with the amendments, yeah, they're not
18	a material change
19	MS. McFADDEN: Well, do we sign it? Deanna's
20	got the copy here. Or do we wait?
21	MR. LEMAY: We don't want to sign it
22	MS. McFADDEN: Okay.
23	MR. WILLOUGHBY: Just a reminder of the
24	process, since you're just considering it tonight,
25	you'd have to unanimously and then go through

1 that -- you could approve it on first reading if 2 you want, and then that way you'd be prepared to 3 finalize it. Or unless everybody wants to see --4 MR. LEMAY: Yeah. 5 MR. WILLOUGHBY: -- a clean copy before you 6 consider it. 7 That's probably the best way to MR. LEMAY: 8 do it. And then just any minor editorial change, 9 "Violation of this ordinance may be subject to 10 fines in accordance with Chapter 154.211 of the 11 Zoning Code." 12 MS. LYNCH: Yeah. 13 MR. LEMAY: Just want to make sure it's clear 14 that everybody knows where we're at. So, I guess 15 make those changes. I'll give this to you. 16 can read my handwriting. 17 MS. LYNCH: Thank you so much. 18 MR. LEMAY: Thank you. We'll get it done. Ι 19 appreciate it. Thank you. 20 MR. WALL: So, should we make a motion to 21 approve it based on the amendments tonight? 22 MR. WILLOUGHBY: My suggestion is you wait 23 until you have to clean copy. 24 MR. LEMAY: You wanna do that? Okay. I'm 25 fine with that. Okay. So, we dealt with

1 something else further down, too. Building 2 Commission. That is me. So, Building Commission 3 met twice since the last meeting, and I'm just 4 gonna kind of hit the highlights. Regarding the 5 beach stairs, Lou Mellen and I are gonna go down 6 and see if some of these beach stairs that were 7 initially felt to be illegal, according to our 8 ordinances, have now been fixed. Because it's 9 been quite a while since we did that, so we're 10 gonna go down. And, hopefully, I'll be on my bike 11 and he'll be on the four-wheeler down there, and 12 we'll make sure that we've got that all figured 13 out. Because we don't want to send letters out to 14 people who have already corrected the problem.

MS4 requirements. We're gonna be getting a sample ordinance from Reggie, who's our consultant on MS4. And that'll start through the process of getting approved, hopefully.

The Captain's Walk property. They were approved to do the excavation on the condition that if the building is not approved, they're gonna need to put that excavation back to its initial state. And so, it's up to them whether they want to start excavation or not.

MS. McFADDEN: They have.

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MR. LEMAY: Yeah, well, I figured they had.

And then 2300 Hazeltine. Lou is gonna get
together with Chris to go over the violations at
that property. There was work done that was never
approved, and so that is forthcoming.

And then we met, also, on August the 11th.

And, again, just to hit the highlights. Building department software is moving forward. We've got this payment system called Payroc that's part of this program. It would allow contractors to pay online. But right now, discussing it with Larry, the thought let's implement the system now, not the Payroc part of the system, and then later decide if we want to do that. We just felt that would create more confusion than we already have at the clerk's office, so we're gonna hold off on that. And who knows, the system may not even — the whole system may not be implemented until December anyway.

Solar ordinance is still pending. There's going to be a workshop between the APC, Town Council, and Building Commission to go over that. We want to make sure that we have that solar ordinance set up just exactly how we want to do it and we don't create any confusion. Part of that

workshop about the solar ordinance also is going to include a careful review of that Captain's Walk property. That building's going to be 12,000 square feet, its going to have, I believe, seven bedrooms. There's gonna have to be some discussion as to whether or not that property's gonna conform with both our ordinances and our comprehensive plan.

2515 Chastleton, work was done without a permit, without a registered contractor. Decision was made that both the contractor and owner are gonna be fined \$500, as per our ordinance. And that's it from Building Commission.

Okay. Next on the agenda, Board of Zoning Appeals. They did not meet, and, in fact, the meeting for tomorrow is canceled. They just didn't have any agenda items.

Advisory Plan Commission did not have a meeting. They will be meeting tomorrow, but all they're gonna be considering is addresses for two properties, so that should be fairly easy and -- What? Yeah, next Monday. I'm sorry.

MS. McFADDEN: When is the APC meeting? Next Monday?

MR. LEMAY: Next Monday. But all they're

1 gonna consider is two addresses, so I think 2 Captain's Walk and one other one. 3 Okay. Building permit and revenue report. 4 Mr. Perry, are you out there? 5 MR. PERRY: I'm out here. Am I unmuted on 6 your side? MR. LEMAY: We hear you. 7 8 MR. PERRY: Okay. Thank you. Building 9 permit revenue report for July, 2023, 20 permits 10 totaling -- permits of \$3,039,520 with revenue of 11 \$6,150. One electric permit for \$111. And legal 12 expenses paid in July, 6,100, Braje, Nelson and 13 Janes. I will entertain a motion for approval. 14 MR. LEMAY: So moved. Is there a second? 15 MR. JOHNSTONE: Second. 16 MR. LEMAY: All in favor, say aye. 17 (Ayes in unison.) 18 MR. LEMAY: Okay. Unfinished business. 19 Stop 29 project update. I think we already did 20 that; right? 21 MR. WALL: So, the Stop 29 project update is 22 essentially about the lawsuit situation. I had an 23 e-mail conversation with Joseph Smith, who 24 represents our insurance company attorney -- or is 25 our insurance company attorney. He tells me that

the process is still in the works. The check from
the town is in the -- in his office's hands, and
the conversations are continuing between the
property owners' attorneys and him, and he hopes
to have that wrapped up very quickly. Right now,
we're just waiting on the property owners'
attorneys in terms of the dismissal of the
lawsuits. We're very close to finishing that up.

MR. LEMAY: Great. Civic upgrade to the cloud update. Is that from Mr. Perry? Civic upgrade?

MR. PERRY: Yes. Should be all done. A few little hitches with the learning curve and the software. Getting K-Plus to talk to Civic and back and forth. We've all got new passwords and new authentication in order to go on the system, which requires the use of our cell phones, we just don't always have the best reception in our little town, as everyone knows. But I believe we're all set. It's all on the cloud now. Cender's office can access Civic remotely, which was really one of the points of doing this. So, I would say we're 90 percent done with a few tweaks to work out.

MR. LEMAY: All right. Stop 17 and 18 project, Haas -- Okay, John. Go ahead.

1 MR. WALL: So, the Stop 17/18 project, as you 2 know, the Council approved the process to continue 3 through bidding so that we can see what the number 4 actually winds up at and we can decide whether we can afford it or not. There are some invoices in 5 6 from Haas & Associates. Looks like there's a 7 total on the agenda. I'm not sure if that's 8 correct, but it says 24,000. We just need to make 9 sure we approve those. So, those are for the 10 engineering work for the bidding process, which is 11 ready to go on the 17 and 18 project. 12 MR. LEMAY: So, you're -- you want to make a 13 motion --14 MR. WALL: Just I'd make a motion for the 15 approval of payment. We already actually 16 authorized the engineering and the bidding process 17 in the earlier sessions. 18 MR. LEMAY: Make a motion to approve. 19 there a second? 20 MR. WALL: I didn't hear a second. 21 move it or did I move it? 22 MR. LEMAY: I made the motion. 23 MR. WALL: You made the -- I'll second it. 24 MR. LEMAY: Discussion? All in favor, say 25 aye.

(Ayes in unison.)

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MR. LEMAY: Opposed? Okay. So, my understanding about that project is that we have collected \$345,000 in that fund, which is the wastewater fund.

MR. WALL: Storm water fund, yeah.

MR. LEMAY: Storm water fund, yeah. But we're projecting the cost is gonna be 350 to \$600,000, so we may have to wait a while on that but the engineering is done?

MR. WALL: Correct. So, the thought was to finalize where we're at. Number one, we -- you know, we're still finalizing the accounting so we know exactly what's in that fund, but Trista did tell us what exactly -- what you described, that there's, like, 345 in that fund. So, the idea is get bids in, see where the numbers fall, and then make a decision about affordability at that point. Because right now, with the supply chain issues and everything else, the engineering estimates typically were pretty accurate historically, but with the environment we're in right now with cost and inflationary issues, so we wanted to try to get some real numbers in. So, it's ready for bidding, which, again, we all approved to do. And

with this approval that we just did, that will proceed to the final bid, and then we'll get some numbers -- What we're gonna try to do is allow them to do this project through the winter rather than, you know, tie them to a specific date. So, that was what was discussed. But we won't -- it won't proceed past bidding until the Council approves that project, the expenditure for it, the rough -- you know, or whatever the funds come in -- whatever the prices come in at.

MR. LEMAY: Okay. Public safety building progress update?

MR. WALL: Public safety building update.

Couple things have happened, positive things, I would say. The building did show up; it looks like an Erector Set out there. If you've been by the site, you can see that. The design team has made their final color choices on some of the major long-lead time items. NIPSCO did relocate the two poles, so we're in good shape. That was a safety issue on the north end of the project.

Concrete foundations are dug and formed up and they'll be starting to pour concrete, I believe, tomorrow. In terms of the logistics for the scheduling, Tom Dolph has been just uber

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cooperative. We've been very pleased together; we've worked on, number one, getting all the furnishings and things out of our building. know Mark is working on getting the police department's things out of the small garage so that the demolition can occur right after Labor Day. Tom's been very gracious; we're actually in the process of moving our -- some of our equipment and then eventually the trucks over to the street garage, where we hope to have them in there only long enough that the building is ready to put the trucks back in the new building so that we don't interrupt Tom's plowing schedule when the cold weather hits. We do have the groundbreaking. Kurt Earnst, one of the co-chiefs on the fire department, mentioned that. groundbreaking is on 8/25, which is Friday, a week from this Friday, at 10:00 a.m. We encourage the public to attend. We will have some refreshments from Al's Karwick that are donating those to our cause, and we look forward to seeing everybody out there for the groundbreaking on the 25th.

MR. LEMAY: Great. Public safety building septic system update?

MR. WALL: I'm not sure why that's on the

agenda. Essentially, we did get a letter from the LaPorte County Health Department stating that we can do one of the alternates that we were proposing, which is holding tanks. That means we'd be on a pump and haul. They're requesting 6,000 gallons, which I don't think we'll have to pump them for about ten years, if that's the case. So, right now, we do have that letter that says we can use holding tanks in lieu of trying to tie into the existing septic system. So, essentially, we're in good shape there. We hope to maybe appeal for a little different system, but right now, we do have that as our ace in the hole.

MS. McFADDEN: What's the cost of that, John?

MR. WALL: Sorry?

MS. McFADDEN: What's the cost?

MR. WALL: We don't have the cost yet. We just got the letter this week, so we do have it to present that -- we have to actually -- the next stage of that process is getting something drawn up. Have to talk to Haas, get something drawn up, and present that back and get some cost information from the contractor. So, we'll have that for Town Council consideration just as soon as we can.

MR. KOCHER: When -- In the process, are we gonna also get plans for a permanent septic system?

MR. WALL: This would be the permanent septic system that's been approved to date. If we want to try for a different system, we have to apply again. So, this was our application that they're approving at this point for this particular system. If we wanna try and do a different system, meaning either build a new septic system or tie into an existing system or, per chance, talk to the club and get into their system somehow, we'd have to present that to the public health officials again. Which we may try to do, but right now, this would be one option that we can do without having to do any more design work. I don't know if that answers your question or not, John.

MR. KOCHER: Yeah, I just hope we don't have to pay for it twice, that's all.

MR. WALL: Right. So, again, this would be the system of -- that would get us out of the hole. So, when you say "pay for it twice" --

MR. KOCHER: Pay for it twice in that we have the holding system that you're talking about and

then go ahead and put a more permanent system in,
whether we expand the present system or build a
whole new system over on Long Beach Country Club
property. I don't know. I mean, that's what was
gonna -- that's what we were gonna do to begin
with, but it didn't work out.

MR. WALL: Right. That didn't work out because everybody petitioned the two health departments and we got into this bag where they made us do this whole --

MR. KOCHER: Yeah, but we couldn't have gone into that system anyway. But that's neither here nor there right now.

MR. LEMAY: Okay. Next up, interlocal agreement with LaPorte County regarding inspections. We've all seen this, I think.

Chris, the only change I see from the final one is on "C" on page two, it says "the town planning department" and it probably ought to be "the town clerk's office will electronically transmit."

That's how we do it now; I would imagine that's what we want to do. So, when a permit application comes in, Deanna would say, "Well, this is an electrical permit; it goes to" --

MR. WILLOUGHBY: Is that the version I sent

1 you today? 2 MR. LEMAY: That is the version you sent 3 today. 4 MR. WILLOUGHBY: I think they sent the 5 wrong -- The language is, "The town, or its 6 designee, will send, " so --7 MR. LEMAY: We'll approve it then. 8 MR. WILLOUGHBY: -- I don't think you have 9 the right version. And then the only other one 10 was verification that the inspection fee went up 11 from 50 to 100. The county plan commission 12 decided that across the board for anybody who has 13 an interlocal agreement and updated the date. 14 with that language that, "the town or its 15 designee," that way it's open ended. .16 MR. LEMAY: As long we change it because we 17 don't have a planning department, per se. 18 MS. McFADDEN: We can go ahead and sign it? 19 MR. WILLOUGHBY: Yeah, that language in there 20 has been approved between us, so I'm not sure what 21 version, so if you have that signature page, I'll 22 take care of making sure --23 (Overlapping speech.) MR. LEMAY: I'll make a --24 25 MR. WILLOUGHBY: -- sign it, as well.

1 MR. KOCHER: I'll second it. 2 MR. LEMAY: Any other discussion? All in 3 favor, say aye. 4 (Ayes in unison.) 5 MS. McFADDEN: Should I keep this for Deanna 6 and then she get --7 MR. WILLOUGHBY: That's fine. 8 MS. McFADDEN: Okay. Do you want to sign it? 9 MR. LEMAY: Okay. Cell tower lease 10 recommendation. Mark, I think you made that 11 recommendation; right? 12 CHIEF SWISTEK: Yes. About three months ago, 13 the town had received an initial proposal from 14 TowerPoint to buy out the current lease for our 15 cell phone tower that's located on town property 16 across from Hacienda. Shortly thereafter, 17 Dr. LeMay had asked that we reach out to 18 Vertical Consultants, which is a consulting group 19 which has experience in cell phone tower lease 20 buyouts. I spoke with their CEO at length, had a 21 few e-mail conversations with him, as well, and 22 they had reviewed TowerPoint's proposal to the 23 town and also reviewed our current lease, which we 24 receive \$931.70 a month for a total income of

11,180 per year. Their recommendation to the Town

1 of Long Beach was that we remain in our current 2 lease agreement and not to move forward with the 3 TowerPoint proposal. So, that is their 4 recommendation to the Town Council, is that we 5 pass on the current proposal that is in front of 6 you. 7 MR. LEMAY: So, does anybody on the Council 8 have any objection to that recommendation? 9 MR. KOCHER: No. 10 MR. LEMAY: All right. Then we don't need to 11 vote. I like that. 12 Holladay Construction Group draw, slash, 13 invoice number four, \$51,568. That's an invoice 14 we need to approve. I'll make a motion to 15 approve; is there a second? 16 MR. WALL: I'll second. 17 MR. LEMAY: Discussion? All in favor, say 18 aye. 19 (Ayes in unison.) 20 MR. LEMAY: Opposed? Amereco Incorporated, 21 environmental report: Existing fire station and 22 police garage building. 23 MR. WALL: So, essentially, because of the 24 environmental environment, I guess you could say

that we're in, or the regulatory environment that

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we're in, you had to do a survey of your building before you demolish it. Essentially, what it amounts to is if you have something that's environmentally dangerous, then you have to make sure that you manifest that particular material into a different landfill than you do for a regular landfill. This report basically states that while there are some trace elements of -- in the glue, I think under the tile, potentially, a little bit of asbestos potentially in that glue. And then a little bit in the wood -- in the glazing along the windows that you have to -- you have to keep that into a regular landfill; you can't put it in a construction fill landfill, meaning where just concrete and brick and sand and those kinds of things go. So, this was always intended to go to a regular landfill, so we're not in any kind of regulatory issue with that. did want us to pull the light fixtures, which include neon bulbs and old time ballasts, as well, so that they don't go into a construction landfill. So, essentially, there was nothing in this report that was any kind of problem for us. And, again, we authorized the payment for this the report's complete, and this -- the issuance of

this report allows the demolition to occur without any regulatory problems.

CHIEF SWISTEK: Dr. LeMay?

MR. LEMAY: Yes?

CHIEF SWISTEK: If I may add, on the Amereco one, the previous meeting, the Council had approved the expenditure for the invoice not to exceed \$2500. We have an invoice in front of us for \$1,720 that was received on August 7th. You may want to just direct the clerk's office that it's clear for payment.

MR. LEMAY: I think the Council wants to do that; right? All in favor, say aye.

(Ayes in unison.)

MR. LEMAY: Okay. CCMG improvement project change order number one. John, are you involved in that?

MR. WALL: Yeah. I don't have the detail in front of me; essentially, the final paperwork for the CCMG needs to come out of the clerk's office relative to that change order. I don't have it with me, but, essentially, what it is is -Mary Lou, the final -- basically, what it amounts to is the final billing for the CCMG work.

CHIEF SWISTEK: I think the major part is we

1	need to follow the steps as indicated by the State
2	to make sure the proper paperwork is submitted
3	through the clerk's office, not to put in jeopardy
4	any future CCMG paving projects. Unfortunately,
5	in previous years, the town did not submit the
6	proper documentation in a timely manner;
7	therefore, we were passed up on one of the
8	opportunities to receive the 75-percent match.
9	So, we just want to assure that everything is in a
10	timely fashion.
11	MR. LEMAY: So, Mr. Perry, we good with that?
12	Are we good with submitting the paperwork to CCMG?
13	MR. PERRY: Of course. I will submit it, as
14	I do everything else, on time. Thank you.
15	MR. LEMAY: Next. Snow plow and salt box
16	purchase request \$24,143 for the Street
17	Department. I'll make a motion to approve that;
18	is there a second?
19	MR. WALL: I'll second.
20	MR. LEMAY: Discussion?
21	MS. McFADDEN: I hope we don't need it.
22	MR. LEMAY: All in favor say aye.
23	(Ayes in unison.)
24	MR. LEMAY: Tree removal from the town
25	right-of-way. Request for additional funding. I

believe we have \$19,500 left in that fund, but we're gonna need to come up with an additional \$500; is that right?

CHIEF SWISTEK: No, sir. We were able to negotiate with Maple City Tree from the current tree budget and the right-of-way maintenance fund, we currently have \$19,950. Maple City Tree has submitted a estimate for that exact amount for the trees that are either damaged, dead, or deemed dangerous on the town's right-of-way. And a full list of the trees was shared with the Tree Board today, and also the full Council has a list of the trees. Just seeking approval to allow Street Superintendent, Tom Dolph, to move forward with the expenditure.

MR. LEMAY: So, we got a \$50 discount?

CHIEF SWISTEK: No, we're good. We're even.

MR. LEMAY: But we got a \$50 discount, though; right?

CHIEF SWISTEK: I'm sorry, yes.

MR. WALL: If I could make a quick comment, just so people understand the severity of these situations. We had one drop over on Lothair in the middle of the night one night couple weeks back and the second half of that's ready to go any

1 time. There's one out on Chastleton, for 2 instance, if it comes down, it's gonna likely hit 3 the fire hydrant that's right there that's on a 4 plastic main. If that happens, it's gonna break that main and there's gonna be just an 5 6 unbelievable amount of water coming flying out of 7 there. There'll be a 20-foot hole before the 8 first phone call comes in. So, these things 9 are -- these are an emergency nature, and we 10 really do need to get these done. 11 MR. LEMAY: Just so everybody knows, that 12 tree ordinance we just passed tonight, there is a 13 section that says if it's an emergency that 14 adjacent homeowner is not gonna get notified, it's 15

just gonna get done. So, I'll make a motion to approve this \$20.000.

MR. KOCHER: Second.

MR. LEMAY: Discussion? All in favor, say aye.

(Ayes in unison.)

MR. LEMAY: All right. Police/fire radio firmware software updates and reprogramming, \$6500 from the LIT fund.

CHIEF SWISTEK: Yes. A little bit of history on that, back in 2016, LaPorte County Emergency

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1 Services, police, fire, EMS, had applied and 2 received a -- partially a grant and then a 3 majority of the expenditures came from LaPorte County Government to purchase all in-car radios 4 5 and portable radios for all of the emergency first responders for the Town of Long Beach; therefore, 6 7 those radios came at no cost to the town. 8 Twenty-sixteen, fast forwarding to 2023, these 9 radios now require a software firmware update, 10 and, also, we need to do some reprogramming. 11 Originally, the fire department radios did not 12 have the police department's frequency in their 13 programming. The police department's frequency is 14 an encrypted frequency. We want to add the police 15 department frequency to the fire department radios 16 so the two departments can communicate; therefore, 17 we need to have a firmware update and 18 reprogramming done to all of the police and fire 19 radios to include anything that is either in a 20 firetruck, in-car police vehicle, or a portable. 21 And the estimated cost for both departments 22 combined shall not exceed \$6500, and we're 23 proposing that it comes from the LIT funds. 24 MR. LEMAY: I'll make a motion to approve; is

there a second?

MR. KOCHER: I'll second.

MR. LEMAY: Discussion? All in favor, say aye.

(Ayes in unison.)

MR. LEMAY: All right. Public hearing regarding Ordinance 2023- regarding amending and restating Title X, Chapter 96, Section 96.1 of the town code. Charges for garbage and refuse removal and leaf pick. That has been posted, and this is now the public hearing. So, I'll open the public hearing. Anybody who wants to speak against can speak now. Anybody on Zoom? Anybody who wants to speak in favor can speak now. Anybody on Zoom? I will close the public hearing. Public hearing is done. So, we can vote on it.

MS. McFADDEN: Well, wait a minute. We have to have a little discussion on this. I want everyone to know that Lynn, who effectively retired in June, came in and worked on all these lots. And this is -- So, we need to keep this in mind: This includes three existing customers have commercial parcels, so one would be Kemp Properties, that's the Hacienda. Little Giant Pizza has one-half acre, .05 lot, their back yard. And the Long Beach Country Club has 26 lots of all

1 sizes. So, Lynn's recommendation is that we pass 2 this, but we exclude parcels under .05 acres to be 3 excluded. And the other thing is, I've talked to 4 Dr. LeMay earlier tonight, I will talk to the country club and see if they will incorporate 5 6 their 26 lots into one lot. Because if not, they 7 would be paying \$462 per year, and it would be 8 about \$5500 for them. So, I'm sure I can convince 9 them. I'll talk to Annette this week. 10 MR. LEMAY: So, basically, we're gonna find 11 out why they haven't combined their lots. If they 12 combine their lots, then we fix the problem. 13 MS. McFADDEN: Right. 14 MR. LEMAY: So, I'd say let's -- I would make 15 a motion to table this until next month. 16 MS. McFADDEN: Should she -- Then Lynn 17 shouldn't start billing in August? 18 MR. LEMAY: She can start billing everyone

MR. LEMAY: She can start billing everyone else.

MS. McFADDEN: Well, everyone else --

MR. WILLOUGHBY: You can't start billing something differently until it becomes a published -- so, you could pass it on first reading, if you chose to move it along. But, you know, until you -- understand, you may have some

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1	significant amendments here.
2	MS. McFADDEN: Okay. Let me
3	MR. LEMAY: So, we just aren't going to
4	charge until next month. We'll table it.
5	MS. McFADDEN: Let's table.
6	MR. LEMAY: It's not gonna make any
7	difference; right? If we do it on first reading,
8	we still can't
9	MR. WILLOUGHBY: I think this one doesn't
10	take effect until the first of the year. Isn't
11	that
12	MS. McFADDEN: No, July 1st, and we're always
13	a month back, so she
14	MR. WILLOUGHBY: Are we confusing
15	MS. McFADDEN: No.
16	MR. WILLOUGHBY: This is the water This is
17	the one with the water that changed the fire;
18	correct?
19	MS. McFADDEN: Storm water.
20	MR. WILLOUGHBY: Storm water. The one that
21	Dr. LeMay is discussing is changing the leaf pick
22	ups so that it charges the vacant lots. So, those
23	are
24	MS. McFADDEN: Okay.
25	MR. WILLOUGHBY: That other one was approved,

but you guys can make that decision. We're not implementing that because that might be a change in to how you deal with that previous change. That was the -- the billing goes out with water department charging for fire service, et cetera, that was going to be effective July 1st, and then Lynn did that research, so that's a separate issue. MS. McFADDEN: Okay. MR. WILLOUGHBY: This one is what Dr. LeMay

MR. WILLOUGHBY: This one is what Dr. LeMay proposed, and it's couched in the ordinance that has garbage, leaf pick up, and it provides charging lots that are not -- unimproved lots.

MR. LEMAY: So, I'd make a motion that we pass this on first reading tonight and hopefully pass it on second reading next month.

MS. McFADDEN: And so, we will not -- Lynn would not activate the Civic system to start the process?

MR. LEMAY: Doesn't start until January 1st.

MR. WILLOUGHBY: On this new -- Let's -- We're talking about two different things. The other one's not starting yet, so that you can figure out that issue that came --

MS. McFADDEN: One is storm water --

(Overlapping speech.)

MR. WILLOUGHBY: That has nothing to do with this one. So, I -- I -- What Mary Lou is saying is under that ordinance, you're gonna start billing it the 1st. Your recommendation is that you wait and then revisit it. Lynn is not -- My suggestion is you just -- Lynn doesn't bill until she receives direction from the Council.

MS. McFADDEN: I'm fine with that. So, we'll table it?

MR. LEMAY: Table's fine. I don't care either way.

MR. WILLOUGHBY: Yeah, that isn't on at all.

And then this one if you pass on first reading,
then you can still consider whether -- you had
your public hearing on it, but you can consider
any additional information. And, again, the crux
of this is charging, which you have not done in
the past, for unimproved lots for leaf pick up.

MS. McFADDEN: Okay.

MR. WILLOUGHBY: And that would not take effect until January 1st.

MR. LEMAY: Okay. So, we'll table that. So, motion to table; is there discussion? Is there a second?

MR. WALL: Second.

MR. LEMAY: All in favor, say aye.

(Ayes in unison.)

MR. LEMAY: All right. MS4 audit.

Reggie Korthals came in and we had the MS4 audit.

We passed that, pretty much, with flying colors.

She's gonna give us the draft ordinance for MS4,

that'll go to the APC, and then hopefully back to

the Town Council. Kelco Enterprise's LLC invoice

for \$6100 for the second pump. Mark, your --

CHIEF SWISTEK: Yes, if I could, I'll give

you a little bit of history on this. Starting

back on February 7th, the Town Council was alerted through e-mail through my office -- and I'll read

the e-mail, it's only -- it's very brief.

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"Just wanted to keep everyone updated that the town hall septic system lift station needed a repair. The control panel in the garage needed a repair to the electrical system. A relay was not working, and the pumps went into failure. The system alarm notified us of the failure. Kelco, the technicians that have serviced the panel and originally installed the system in 2001, were able to order a part for the control system. As of today, the part was installed and the lift station

is back in full service. The repairs will be paid for from the building maintenance fund."

Then on the second e-mail on Wednesday, May 31st, sent to the Town Council through my office:

"Good evening, the town hall septic system lift station operates on two separate submersible pumps. Pump one that was installed in 2013 is currently not operational. I am in the process of securing an estimate for the cost of installation of the new pump. Until then, we are operating on pump number two. The pumps typically alternate from one to the other when in full operational cycle. We should have enough funds in the 2023 town hall maintenance fund to complete this expenditure. Just wanted to keep everyone updated that we are working on the maintenance issue."

Then on July 25th, I notified the Council through e-mail: "The secondary submersible pump in the town hall septic lift station was replaced and is now back in service. Repairs will be paid for from the town hall maintenance budget."

And then, lastly, an e-mail received to the Council on July 31st: "Good evening. May 31st e-mail notification to the Council that the town hall lift station has a pump out of service,

repairs were classified as an emergency because if the other pump had failed, we would have had no septic system nor lift station at the town hall.

Kelco is also the original installer of the lift station from 2001, when the town hall renovation took place. Please let me know if any additional information is needed."

And Dr. LeMay and I also talked about this, and there's a \$6100 expenditure. There are enough remaining funds in the town hall maintenance budget for 2023, and we just ask that the Council approve this emergency expenditure to pay for the repair and replacement of the pump.

MS. McFADDEN: Is Kelco a registered contractor?

CHIEF SWISTEK: Originally, I did not check on that, and that is my fault. I take full responsibility for that. In talking to Larry Wall, he tells me that in some cases, when we have to bring in expertise, in this case, Kelco, I would assume would never ever do any other work in the Town of Long Beach, other than us calling them in on this emergency repair. I have asked that they register; I don't believe they have as of to date, but I take full

responsibility that I did not check the town's 1 2 registry, and that is my fault. 3 MS. McFADDEN: So, did they register? CHIEF SWISTEK: I have asked them to do so 4 5 through e-mail, and to date, I do not believe they have. 6 7 MS. McFADDEN: Okay. 8 MR. LEMAY: So, I'll make a motion to approve 9 the expenditure; is there a second? MR. KOCHER: I'll second. 10 MR. LEMAY: Discussion? 11 12 MR. JOHNSTONE: Is that subject to the concern about making sure that they're registered? 13 MR. WALL: The work is done, Mike. I don't 14 15 know how you could make it subject to. I think we encouraged them to register, but --16 17 MR. JOHNSTONE: I think it's the company that 18 we're talking about. Not so much about the work 19 being done. MR. LEMAY: I guess one concern I'd have is 20 21 if we go back now and say they need to register, 22 when the next pump goes out, are they liable to 23 tell us where to go? MR. JOHNSTONE: So, we're approving this and 24 we're doing an exclusion then to the contractor 25

being registered?

MR. LEMAY: Well, I mean, --

MR. JOHNSTONE: I'm just asking to clarify.

MR. LEMAY: I guess it's a matter of practicality. I mean, if we want to follow the letter of the law, we would make them register, which they really have no incentive to do, because the work is done. And, you know, if they don't get paid, we'll be sued. On the other hand, if we want to follow the letter of the law, we can fine them \$500, which is the same thing. What's their incentive? What's gonna happen the next time a pump goes out?

MS. McFADDEN: How much is registration?

MR. LEMAY: At least a hundred dollars.

MR. WILLOUGHBY: Well, to clarify, I think it's under the purview of the Building Commission. So, you could give direction to the Building Commission to follow up on that. Because it is under their purview to require and to, you know, pursue any action against them.

MR. KOCHER: I've got a point of inquiry on the pump -- different subject -- is this pump the same size pump as the one that failed? It's just a replacement of what was previously there; is

that right? Or is this a bigger pump, or . . .?

CHIEF SWISTEK: This is a more efficient pump. It is slightly smaller, and I sent the specifications to the LaPorte County Health Department. I did check with LaPorte County Health Department and the health department said that no permit was required; however, we shall share with them the specifications of the pump. That was e-mailed to the LaPorte County Health Department this afternoon and to all the Council members, as well. That was received from Kelco this afternoon.

MR. KOCHER: But the pump is essentially the same type of pump, just a little more efficient because it's a newer pump?

CHIEF SWISTEK: Correct. And it comes with a three-year warranty. In addition to the discussion about the registration, I had spoke to Larry Wall about this at length, as well, and Larry tells me that the majority of the contract registration process is to protect the homeowners within the town to make sure that they are working with somebody who is licensed, insured, and bonded. I will tell you, it is very difficult to find somebody to work on a lift station. And I

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1	agree that if we lose Kelco, who originally put
2	this lift station in in 2001, we might be hard
3	pressed to find somebody to work on the town's
4	lift station.
5	MR. LEMAY: Any other discussion?
6	MR. WALL: Was there a motion to approve this
7	invoice?
8	MR. LEMAY: There's a motion and a second.
9	MR. WALL: Okay. So, we need to vote on
10	that.
11	MR. LEMAY: Yep. So, all in favor, say aye.
12	(Ayes in unison.)
13	MR. LEMAY: Opposed? Okay.
14	Haas & Associates, two invoices totaling \$13,126
15	regarding Yellow Bear Farms building permit.
16	Basically, the Building Department had to have
17	Haas & Associates look at this building because,
18	again, it's 12,000 square feet, seven bedrooms, I
19	have no idea how many bathrooms and what else.
20	And so,
21	MS. McFADDEN: It's okay, Bob. You don't
22	have to clean the bathrooms.
23	MR. LEMAY: I don't. No, I won't be. And
24	so, basically, we need to pay that
25	Haas & Associates \$12,126.25 (sic) for their work,

1 and then we will be reimbursed by the Yellow Bear 2 Farms folks for that. But we need approval to pay 3 Haas & Associates. MS. McFADDEN: I make a motion to pay Haas & 4 5 Associates and then get reimbursed by Yellow Bear. 6 MR. LEMAY: Somebody else wanna second it? 7 MR. WALL: I'll second. 8 MR. LEMAY: All in favor, say aye. (Ayes in unison.) 9 10 MR. LEMAY: Opposed? 11 CHIEF SWISTEK: Dr. LeMay, if I could, on a 12 housekeeping matter, on that particular topic, we 13 probably need to come up with the procedures on 14 how we're going to invoice the resident -- the 15 homeowner to seek the reimbursement. I think we 16 still may be a little unclear on that. So that we 17 have kind of a follow through to make sure that 18 payment's received since the town's going to be 19 paying it initially up front. 20 MS. McFADDEN: How about a letter from the 21 clerk's office? 22 MR. WALL: The clerk's office just generates 23 an invoice, I would think. 24 MS. McFADDEN: Yeah. 25 MR. WALL: And, essentially our ordinances

allow for this, in many instances. The shoreline protection has verbiage in there for it and I believe our regular ordinances has verbiage in it for it if the town requires engineering.

MR. LEMAY: Yeah. Yeah, I wonder if it wouldn't be better for the homeowner to pay Haas & Associates directly, but I was told that Haas & Associates is the town's contractor, engineer, and so it would be appropriate to do it that way, although it would be cleaner.

MS. McFADDEN: Yeah, it would be. We don't have to run it through the books.

MR. LEMAY: They don't like that. Okay.

Larry Wall, Building Commissioner, pay
classification. So, we were told that Larry Wall
is now a contractor, or is -- has been a
contractor. I guess Mr. Perry was told by the

State Board Of Accounts that it would be
preferable if he was a town employee. So, right
now, we have -- What's the gal's name from Cender?

MS. McFADDEN: Trista.

MR. LEMAY: Trista checking on that, just to see if, indeed, that's what we have to do or if it's just a preference. Because, really, for us to change the way we're doing things, I think

would be difficult for the town, but it could be done. Larry doesn't have a strong opinion one way or another. It's not gonna affect how much he's paid. So, right now, I would say let's table that until we hear back from Trista.

I think I already talked about that Payroc system, so we can forget that one. Okay.

Clerk/treasurer's office year-do-date expenses with the related to all clerk, slash, water office employees. Six days ago, I asked Mr. Perry for report on that. Mr. Perry, do you have something for us?

MR. PERRY: Well, I responded six days ago, and I'll happily read that response, if you'd like. But, basically, --

MR. LEMAY: No. Mr. Perry, do you have the report?

MR. PERRY: I have a report in process for all the departments, not just my own. There's no point in looking at just my department. Let's look at all of them to make sure we're in budget for each and every one of them. Not just a public trial for Tim Perry at every Council meeting.

There's no point in it other than your vendetta.

MR. LEMAY: Yeah, you weren't -- you weren't

1 here at the budget and finance committee when all 2 the other departments gave their reports. 3 fact, you haven't been here for the last two budget and finance meetings. I'd like to just 4 5 point out that, you know, the clerk/treasurer is a 6 member of that committee. In fact, especially 7 when we're going through a budget for next year, 8 it's rather critical that the clerk/treasurer 9 attend those meetings. 10 MR. PERRY: Well, yes, but when the 11 departments misrepresent their expenses, and when 12 I can't get true figures on pending lawsuits and 13 legal fees, what's the point of budgeting if I 14 don't have numbers to budget with? 15 MR. LEMAY: Okay. So, what I would like is

MR. LEMAY: Okay. So, what I would like is I'd like to know what's budgeted, what we spent last year and the year before.

MR. PERRY: Yes. For all departments I'll have that. No problem.

MR. LEMAY: For the clerk/treasurer's office,
I'm particularly interested in. Okay?

MR. PERRY: I'll throw all of them in there for extra credit. Don't worry.

MR. LEMAY: You know, I guess I'm struck that the clerk/treasurer's office has expanded rather

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1 dramatically during your tenure. You know, 2 Bill de Funiak took care of both the water 3 department and the clerk/treasurer's office with 4 just him and Deanna. How many clerk/treasurer 5 deputies do you have now? Because I understand we 6 have a new one. 7 MR. PERRY: Well, when Bill de Funiak was 8 there, he had Helen and he had Lynn, also. 9 MS. McFADDEN: He had Lynn --10 MR. LEMAY: How many deputy clerk/treasurers 11 do we have now? 12 MR. PERRY: We have Deanna, we have Lynn 13 part-time, who was retired but is helping on the 14 project, like Mary Lou mentioned. Honor -- What? 15 MR. LEMAY: Go ahead. I won't interrupt you. 16 Go ahead. 17 MR. PERRY: Honor was under my purview, but 18 was capped at 20 hours a week, but now works under 19 the chief and works approximately 35 to 40 hours a 20 week. But her hours are still being billed to my 21 department for some reason; we need to adjust 22 that. 23 Laurel replaced Helen, who, as I mentioned, 24 was there when Bill was there. So, I think

net/net, it's about the same. Year-to-date

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expenses with Cender through June of 2023 were about what they were from -- to year-to-date June, We don't have year-to-date for them through August yet. I talked to Trista about that, and they're working on it. So, I don't see a big difference; it's complicated work, Doctor. We're doing the best we can. When you refuse to pay anybody in my office any more money but require more work, that's really not how it works. Deanna has been there 18 years and is just about the lowest paid person in the town, and it's a shame that we overload her and pay her so lowly. So, we'll get the figures to you, but I think it'll be an eye-opener when you see how far over budget the other departments are in relation to ours. Thank you.

MR. LEMAY: Okay. Because my numbers suggest that year-to-date, you've paid your four people in the clerk/treasurer's office \$52,785.82. The people in the water department, \$29,645. And that's in addition to your \$34,000 a year. And Cender and Company you paid \$12,000 just in the month of June. These numbers are, I'm sure, way, way over budget. They're certainly way, way over what Mr. de Funiak cost the town.

MR. PERRY: I beg to differ. And really, I 1 2 mean, again, let's look at the numbers for every 3 department, and let's look at the \$550,000 bill 4 we're going to have from the town of Michigan City for the sewer project that didn't work out. Let's 5 look at the ever-growing bill for the public 6 7 safety building. I mean, --8 MR. LEMAY: You can deflect all you want, Mr. Perry, but bottom line is you have abused your 9 10 office --11 MR. PERRY: Deflect? You're the king of 12 deflecting. You're the one talking about \$60 late 13 fees from my department when we're throwing money 14 around like it's going out of style. 15 MR. LEMAY: Are you saying your late fees are fine? 16 17 MR. PERRY: I'm not saying they're --Is that what you're saying? 18 MR. LEMAY: 19 MR. PERRY: No, sir, I said \$60 is small in 20 relation to all the money being spent. And that, 21 on your part, is deflection. 22 MS. McFADDEN: Let's move on. 23 MR. LEMAY: All right. Cender and Company year-to-date, \$11,956; that's in June. We haven't 24 25 gotten July's bill yet, but it will probably be

1	higher because I know Trista's been doing a lot
2	of
3	MR. PERRY: You're right. It was your
4	recommendation we hire them, by the way. Let's
5	not forget about that. Thank you.
6	MR. LEMAY: Yeah, well, that would keep us
7	out of trouble with the State Board Of Accounts.
8	MR. PERRY: You can't have it both ways, and
9	we are being looked at by the State Board Of
10	Accounts, not for things
11	(Overlapping speech.)
12	MR. LEMAY: 2024 preparations. Set
13	timeline for ordinance. So, do we have a timeline
14	for that, John?
15	MR. WALL: I'm not involved in the salary
16	ordinance right now. I think that's HR.
17	MR. LEMAY: Oh, I'm sorry. Mary Lou? Where
18	are we at?
19	MS. McFADDEN: The chief and I will we're
20	meeting in September, and we'll be ready. We
21	won't be late.
22	MR. LEMAY: Okay.
23	MS. McFADDEN: I had something here that's
24	not on the agenda, and I think it's on who can
25	sign checks.

1 MR. LEMAY: That's coming up. 2 MS. McFADDEN: Oh, okay. What's it called? 3 MR. LEMAY: That's the new agenda item that I 4 added, the internal --5 MS. McFADDEN: Oh, okay. 6 MR. LEMAY: So, unimproved courtway behind 7 2223 and 2225 Lakeshore Drive. I think I sent 8 everybody an e-mail on that. I asked folks to go 9 take a look at it. There's an alley that's right 10 off of Chastleton; it's the roadway to the right, 11 right before you hit Lakeshore Drive. And, 12 basically, it's a dead-end alley. 13 MS. McFADDEN: I think Kocher should pay for 14 that. It's right behind his house. 15 MR. LEMAY: Well, I looked at it. And I've 16 got a couple thoughts. I hope you're all familiar 17 with the property, but to put that alley in, you'd 18 have to remove some trees back there, that's for 19 sure. And there's quite a difference in elevation 20 change -- elevation back there. I talked to 21 Tom Dolph and he said, "Yeah, that'd be a bit of a 22 project." 23 And the other thing is, that garage that's 24 back by John Kocher's house, that would prevent

that alley from going all the way straight through

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to -- What's that street on the other side? MS. McFADDEN: Hazeltine?

MR. LEMAY: Hazeltine. So, to me, all we would be doing is extending that alley for two houses. And I guess my thought is is that the folks that live there, you know, they bought it without an alley behind there. I'm not sure it's the town's obligation to give them a driveway. But I'm open to other people's comments. there comments?

MR. WALL: I would only say that we have other situations, not exactly similar to this, but there are other areas in town sitting up at 16, 17, that are similar in nature; meaning, that they're not improved. The roads are not improved. So, if we want to entertain doing one, we ought to look at all of 'em. Because we have areas that are similar to this in nature, that are right-of-ways that were not improved in the original town roadway system. So, if we wanna do this, we probably should canvas all of 'em and decide if we wanna do anything with any or all of 'em.

MR. KOCHER: I think -- I think the reason for the homeowners -- and I haven't talked to

them -- but, you know, they have to park on
Lakeshore Drive. And, as we all know, that's
touchy at best on weekends. I think that's their
main concern is everybody else on Lakeshore Drive
can park behind their homes between 22 and 23, but
these two or three homeowners can't. And that's
the problem. I see where the problem is. But the
terrain of that area, like Doctor just said, is -there's a dip down there and it'd take a lot of
fill to level out. So, I don't know what the
answer is. Good earth moving equipment to solve
the problem.

MR. LEMAY: I'll entertain a motion. Or if we're doing nothing, we don't have a motion. So, I guess we'd need a motion if we wanted to improve it. All right. So, not hearing a motion, we'll move on.

Town welcome signs. People have been concerned about our town welcome signs. While I admit they're not the most beautiful, we have had a great decrease in the number of unregistered contractors doing work in the town. So, they have accomplished that. They're not the most attractive, they don't show up at night, but then again, we don't have a lot of contractors coming

in at night. I was given a letter from Tom King 1 where he talked about -- he suggested on 2 MR. JOHNSTONE: Nextdoor. 3 4 MR. LEMAY: What's it called? MR. JOHNSTONE: Nextdoor. 5 MR. LEMAY: Why don't you take care of this, 6 7 Mike. You summarize it. You're the one --MR. JOHNSTONE: Yeah. I -- I don't really 8 spend any time on Nextdoor, but my wife caught 9 10 this particular post by Tom King, which I thought it was very thoughtful, and I thought it was 11 important enough and -- to bring it to the table 12 for discussion. After his posting, he got a lot 13 of favorable response on Nextdoor. It's very, 14 15 very short, so I'll read it to you so you kind of get the flavor of his remarks. Again, I think 16 17 they were very thoughtful. "Do many others wish we could do more to 18 enhance the entrances to Long Beach? We have our 19 iconic pillars leading inland at many points on 20 21 Lakeshore Drive, but the entrances from Karwick 22 and Moore Road do not share the same attractiveness and sophistication. This post is 23 not to elicit criticism of the new signs, rather 24 I'm checking the level of interest proposing 25

something more to our town, government. looking for positive ideas. I'd like -- I'd be happy to present them if there is sufficient What about adding the same pillars and interest. lighting from Lakeshore Drive to the other entrances? Historically, all entrances to the town had signs that read something like "Long Beach: Beautiful; let's keep it so." Perhaps we could incorporate the same with a refreshed look. Perhaps we could add masonry "Welcome to Long Beach" signage to new pillars or something. Just some thoughts. I look at the nice entrances to nearby communities and hope we can do more. And if there are not available funds, perhaps we can raise monies for it. Project -- Thoughts?"

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And, again, as I mentioned, his comments were very favorably responded to on Nextdoor, and I simply bring it up because representing, obviously, the residents of our community, and I think it was good input, so I just open it up for discussion.

MS. McFADDEN: Well, I want to say, prior to us -- three of us being on the -- four of us being on the Council, Long Beach Civic Association

offered to put up a -- it was a very tasteful sign, and they couldn't please the Council, so they backed away. It was a very tasteful sign.

MR. KOCHER: I think the reason -- some objection to that is -- and Civic, I think, was gonna put up about 25,000, or it was a substantial sum, and some people objected to the wording, or the verbiage. It said, "Welcome to Long Beach"; they didn't like the welcoming aspect of it, which I found strange.

MR. LEMAY: I wonder if Long Beach Civic would like to talk to this Council about it.

Anybody have any connections with Civic?

MS. McFADDEN: Civic? Let me think about that. Well, John Mengel --

MR. KOCHER: John Mengel's on it.

MS. McFADDEN: He might be open to that.

MR. KOCHER: I think Megan Applegate --

MS. McFADDEN: Actually, John Yoder, I believe, is still the president. He lives down here on Oriole. But, yeah, so, it was before John Yoder's time. They worked with Nick Meyer, and they couldn't please the -- The prior Council was hard to please.

MR. LEMAY: Well, why don't we put out some

1 feelers? You wanna maybe talk to --MS. McFADDEN: I'll send -- I'll send him an 2 3 e-mail and say, "Hey, what do you think?" gotta put that on my to-do list. 4 5 MR. LEMAY: All right. Thank you for putting this on 6 MR. JOHNSTONE: 7 the agenda. 8 MR. LEMAY: Yep. Okay. And, finally, 9 Internal Controls. We've got a suggested resolution from Trista, who's concerned about 10 11 availability for signatures at the clerk's office. 12 And basically what this -- I quess -- Does it have 13 to be done at a meeting, Chris? 14 MR. WILLOUGHBY: Doesn't have to be. 15 MR. LEMAY: Okay. Basically, to allow other 16 deputy clerks, other people working in the office, 17 to sign checks so that they can go out in a timely fashion. I think everybody's seen that; right? 18 19 Anybody have any objection to it? I'll make a 20 motion to adopt this resolution; is there a 21 second? 22 MS. McFADDEN: I second it. 23 MR. LEMAY: All in favor, say aye. 24 (Ayes in unison.) 25 Okay. Public comments? MR. LEMAY: Let's

1 start in person first.

MS. BINDER: I'm sorry. Do you hear me at all?

MR. LEMAY: No, we're not doing Zoom yet, but we will, so stay right there.

MS. BINDER: Okay. Public comment.

MS. REMIJAS: Hi. Good evening, everyone.

Anita Remijas, Stop 23 or 2300 Florimond. There
is a court reporter and a stenographer at every
meeting, and it would seem to me that these
minutes, if they are, in fact, being done by the
clerk/treasurer or the deputy clerk/treasurer,
that would be an easy way to solve an issue of how
accurate these minutes are. And they are
important. I remember years ago going back
through a lot of minutes, and I do the minutes for
Park Board, and I try to be precise and complete,
so it's just a suggestion. We do have a court
reporter at every single meeting.

In terms of the NIPSCO bills that Park Board asked about. Ms. McFadden, I appreciate that you jumped in and said, "I know somebody; I can do it," but I think the history is that Joy Schmitt has asked several times, Joe Jogmen has asked, and Chief Swistek at the Community Center meeting

today said that he has asked. We used to get these; I understand that Deanna said she will get them, and she's busy. If our clerk/treasurer was in the office, Deanna would still be able to be getting the bills done -- I'm sorry. Oh, I thought you were closing your eyes when I said something. That the bills would still be able to come out as they had been done until January, apparently.

The politicizing is obvious. Mr. Perry jumps in with things. As something as simple -- I'm sorry, what? I -- Something as simple as an e-mail that was sent to a number of people about the groundbreaking ceremony on August 25th at 10:00, it went to a number of people, I mean, many, you know, different departments. And it was pushed back to chief as the town administrator. The clerk/treasurer has always handled all of the e-mails, and it was just, you know, an e-mail saying, "I don't want to do it. You do it, Chief. You handle it."

You Council members are supposed to represent the interests of the town, including me, as a resident. If you're not aware of the clerk/treasurer's many deficiencies, you should

1 And if you are aware, shame on you. be. And I've 2 used those words before, for protecting the 3 clerk/treasurer, for the supporting his lack of 4 work ethic, and his general lack of work. I find 5 it hard to accept that you three, particularly Mr. Kocher, Mr. Johnstone, and Ms. McFadden, would 6 7 accept this level of incompetence in your own 8 And it is costing our town money; it's not 9 just a matter of \$60 a month. As a resident, the 10 concern of costs, it's just concerning to me that 11 there are red flags out there that he's not doing 12 his job. It's been brought up every month. 13 he still has another four and a half months and 14 access to everything in the town, and I hope that 15 you would look at yourselves and look at what you 16 know and vote accordingly. Thank you. 17

MR. LEMAY: Any other comments here in the room?

MS. LYNCH: I'm Ellyn Lynch again, and I live at 2225 Lakeshore Drive; I'm the one who wrote the letter about the alley behind our two homes. My neighbor and I are just -- we were like, "Why didn't it go through when they were putting it in?" And part of the reason is access to the backyard. Also, all the electric is back there.

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The pole is in my backyard. And NIPSCO or anyone who would need to get back there -- come in my house -- come down my driveway, when that would be something that they would keep clear. I already have some tree branches I have to cut up because they're gonna fall on the pole wires.

I guess -- And I know it's an elevation, and I know Tom is wonderful -- We're not looking for it to go through; we just want access to the back of our house. So, we're not looking for a huge money project for that alley, but we just were concerned, like, why we never were included when that whole alley was put in. So, I guess I just felt like I should say something since I was sitting in the audience.

MR. LEMAY: How long ago was it put in?

MS. LYNCH: I don't know. When we moved in, we started -- I remember we had Tom come out and he was cutting some trees down and stuff like that. And I hate doing hearsay, but my back neighbor is Mr. Kean, and he said he didn't want that to go through and that he had kept it from going through. True? Not true? I don't know. All I know is that my -- I have a very wide drive.

I have access to my backyard; my next-door

neighbor is landlocked. She can't get to anything; she's got two parking spots in the front, which are really town property, and it's just landlocked. And then, not only that, but we do have all the electrical back there. So, just concerned. It's not like it's an emergency or it's going to be on the '23 budget or anything like that, we would just like to start the paperwork and hopefully be able to get some of that done. Or maybe just add a couple of trees every year to have them taken down there so we can get back there and just put stone down or something so we can get to our yards. That's all.

MR. LEMAY: Okay. Any other public comments here? All right. Now public comments from Zoom.

MS. BINDER: I'm online; can you hear me?
MR. LEMAY: I hear you.

MS. BINDER: Very good. I'm Rima Binder at 2709 Roslyn Trail, Long Beach. A member and past president of the beach garden club. We have discussed the signage coming into Long Beach, and we would like to be involved in developing and designing a sign that is welcoming to this community. The sign really says, "Welcome to Long Beach," and the next thing you see is the

registration of construction and designers. And I know I've tried to hire a few people and sent them to town hall, and I've never seen them again. The process may be very difficult; I don't know.

But I think our club has been around for 90 years in this community, and I would like to suggest that the Civic and other clubs and organizations in this community get together, be neighbors, and design a club that be representative of who we are as Long Beach.

We're -- And neighbors together working together and enjoying the beach community. So, I would really ask and suggest that there -- a committee be developed and those signage be either restored to what we have or new signage be made -- construction -- that is really representative of who we are as a community. Thank you very much.

MR. LEMAY: Anybody else on Zoom?

MR. PERRY: Yes, I'll make a public comment.

I'm Tim Perry at 1802 Lakeshore Drive. My

performance gets brought up every month by the

same person, and that's why it's brought up every

month. And if that person is so concerned about

the finances of the town, she can start by paying

her fine for using an unregistered contractor and

have her contractor pay his fine for performing work in Long Beach -- potentially environmentally dangerous work -- in Long Beach. Thank you.

MS. REMIJAS: That's inaccurate.

MR. LEMAY: Any other comments?

MR. DEHNER: Yes. Jim Dehner,

2300 Fairway Drive. So, just in -- as a point of reference, I understand we are having a groundbreaking ceremony next Friday, the 25th.

Ground seems to be broken, but we'll have the ceremony. And, as a celebration, I think it would be appropriate if we extended the invitation to not just everyone in the Town of Long Beach, but to everybody in the county of LaPorte, since it's through their generosity that we are going to be the beneficiaries of a new public service building. So, that's first.

Second, I just want to make a point of reference with regard to -- we've used the terminology "septic systems," and while I'm sitting here, I looked up the definition according to the United States EPA. And the definition of a septic system are "underground wastewater treatment structures that use a combination of natural and technological processes to treat

1 wastewater from household plumbing produced by 2 bathrooms, showers, kitchen drains, and laundry." 3 We do not have a septic system; we are going to have a holding tank, and we are going to be 4 5 having pump and haul. And that's okay if that 6 works, and it probably will work, but for -- going 7 forward, let's get the terminology correct. 8 Because I understand in today's Town Council 9 meeting, we were getting very specific about being 10 correct in matters. So, thank you. 11 MR. LEMAY: Anyone else on Zoom? Any Council 12 comments? Claims approval? 13 MR. PERRY: Hi. Claims approval: 14 checks 19999 through 20068 totaling \$213,990.45; 15 water department checks numbers 54747 to 54769 16 totaling \$128,611.33. July payroll, \$96,659.53, 17 that includes summer camp. I will entertain a 18 motion for approval. 19 MR. LEMAY: I'll approve that; is there a 20 second? 21 MR. JOHNSTONE: Second. MR. LEMAY: Discussion? All in favor, say 22 23 aye. 24 (Ayes in unison.) 25 MR. LEMAY: Make a motion to adjourn?
